About the proposed Gordonbush extension

An application has been submitted to the Scottish Government for a proposed 16 turbine extension to the south-west of the existing Gordonbush Wind

The proposed extension has been carefully designed to minimise visibility from the surrounding landscape, particularly Strath Brora, and also maximise the existing infrastructure on site.

SSE held two public exhibitions in 2013 and 2015 to gain feedback on the proposal from the community before submitting it's application. Should the project gain consent SSE's community investment fund policy for new onshore wind farms of £5,000 per megawatt (MW) of installed capacity would apply. Half of this would feed into a local fund to support community groups and organisations, and the other half would feed into a regional Sustainable Development Fund which aims to support groups and organisations within The Highland Council local authority area.



SSE is headquartered in Scotland and supports 1,800 jobs (staff and contractor) in the Highlands and Islands making SSE one of the largest private sector employers in the region.

Gordonbush is a 35 turbine wind farm located approximately 12km north-west of Brora, in Sutherland and has an installed capacity of 71.75MW.

The site has been operational since June 2012 and since then has already generated enough electricity each year to power over 60.000 homes*.

SSE aims to ensure that the lasting legacy of our developments is a positive one for the communities within which we live and work. Our objectives are to deliver green energy, local economic benefits, jobs, training, community development and social and environmental responsibility.



SSE Open4Business initiative

Our approach is to ensure that as many local businesses and contractors as possible benefit from the opportunities our local projects bring with them. From development to operation we seek to utilise local services, skills and supplies to ensure that our projects have a lasting positive effect in the local area.

Education and training

SSE has committed to delivering a pilot training initiative for young people with the University of Highlands and Islands (Inverness College) with a view to significantly scaling up recruitment and training between now and 2020.

Since 2007 SSE has employed 800 apprentices and trainees which represents an investment of £64M – about £80,000 for every person.

Our accredited apprenticeship programme offers the opportunity to gain new skills and qualifications and will set the path to a long-term rewarding career and the opportunity to make a difference.

As part of this programme, for school leavers living in Rogart, Golspie, Brora and Helmsdale, the Gordonbush apprenticeship scheme has been set up to support young people aged 16 to 24.
