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Foreword

To achieve energy security, the world needs clean, affordable, and sustainable energy. It's SSE Renewables' purpose to help deliver it. With renewables now the most costeffective form of electricity generation, SSE Renewables' growing portfolio will support a more affordable energy future, and ensure countries have the homegrown, sustainable energy needed to boost energy security.

The level of change required to deliver on climate commitments is unprecedented - an industrial revolution is underway. Change of this scale brings social consequences and we must learn lessons from history to make sure that the transition to net zero is fair and just. That is why SSE Renewables has a long and proud history of sharing the economic value from our renewables assets with communities. Our community funds are crucial in supporting the people and places that host this critical renewable energy infrastructure and given their scale, have the potential to transform the social capital of local places.

In 2022/23 we have invested more than £10.4 million in 1,066 community projects. This demonstrates that we deliver on our values, and I am proud that the communities we work with continue to grow their ambition. We work with incredibly resilient communities which continually create opportunities and growth for their local areas. This is highlighted by the varied projects they are adopting to achieve a green future - from aquaponics to community owned wind turbines and retrofit academies. We are delighted to be working collaboratively with these communities as we strive towards net zero.

This year, at SSE Renewables, we mark significant milestones in our work with communities. From the conclusion of our first offshore community fund, with £6 million donated to 361 projects from the Beatrice Community Fund, through to the 10th anniversary of our flagship Sustainable Development Fund. For a decade we have shared the benefits of renewables across wider regions, and we see the socio-economic impact this brings to communities and local economies. Our experience over the last decade highlights that the regions of benefit must be proportionate to the size of investment. Widening the areas of benefit to a national level risks reducing the impact that renewable investment can have on the rural and coastal communities who need it most.

As we secure increased international renewable development and operation, we can share our community

experience from both the UK and Ireland and receive reciprocal learnings from across Europe, Asia, America, and Australia. The needs of every community are unique but what remains consistent is their resilience and ambition for the future.



Achieving our priorities

2022/23 has been a year of growth and development for SSE Renewables' community commitments. We have begun to develop community funds for a range of onshore and offshore sites and looked at how we support communities for our international locations. To meet the growing demands of the programme, we have implemented a new management structure and recruited new employees with substantial community development and grant management experience. We achieved the following priorities in the last year:

Green transition – in the last year, communities have been increasing their focus on reducing carbon intensity. This highlights the collective action needed to achieve a just transition. Over £3 million has been donated to projects which support a green future including electric community vehicles, insulation for households in extreme fuel poverty (p7) and testing new and innovative approaches to agriculture (p9).

Improved reporting – to prepare for the growing value of the investment portfolio, we have completed a procurement exercise to implement a new grant management system. This is expected to enter into operation across the funds in 2023/34.

Tackling the rise in cost of living – our funds have been supporting communities to deal with to deal with rising costs. This has included funding additional advice services, increasing funding for capital projects, and supporting community warm space schemes (p16).

New sites – SSE Renewables has continued to develop its pipeline to meet demand for local, green energy sources. Community consultations have started for the Lenalea Community Fund in Ireland. Discussions for the shared ownership of Strathy South Wind Farm in the Scottish Highlands have progressed with Johnston Carmichael being selected as independent consultants to support the discussions.

Completion of Beatrice Community Fund – A joint venture partnership with RRPL, TRiG and Equitix, Beatrice, SSE Renewables' first offshore wind farm in the UK has first offshore wind farm has provided a community fund worth £6 million, with the final awards being made in 2023. The impact report (p19) highlighted that 91% of funded projects are still benefiting communities.

2023/24

Priorities

Offshore community benefit – we are actively participating in the Scottish Government working group to update the Good Practice Principles for Community Benefits from Offshore Renewables which will be published in 2023/24.

Regional funding – SSE Renewables' flagship Sustainable Development Fund will mark its 10th anniversary in 2023 with the publication of an impact report. The anniversary highlights the impact that renewable community commitments can have across wider communities. However, for this funding to achieve true impact, the region must be proportionate to the level of investment.

Viking Community Fund – Shetland Community Benefit Fund will publish the finding of their community consultation in 2023 which will identify the priorities for the Viking Community Fund once the wind farm becomes operational in 2024. The fund will be worth an anticipated £2.2 million per year. New grant management – we will implement a new, tailored grant management system. The system will reduce the information needed from groups who re-apply for funds and will improve the efficiency of grant making decisions and the payment of funds. The system will be able to provide ESG and social impact reports.

Shared ownership – we will continue to progress our commitment to shared ownership by advancing discussions with the communities near the Strathy South Wind Farm.

International provision – we will use the experience developed in both the UK and Ireland to help share learning for our international growth. We will build community commitments which reflect the needs of the specific countries and regions. We will facilitate networks so communities across our international operations can share learning and experience.

SSE Renewables' Community Commitments

SSE Renewables is an international developer and operator, and we pledge to deliver impactful commitments to communities across the countries in which we operate.

Core to our operations are the following principles:



Value based approach – our commitment to communities and sustainability is embedded in our corporate values.



Focused on communities – we know local people are the experts of their own area and we will work with them to provide flexible interventions.



Transparency – we will treat communities with respect and provide honest, open, and meaningful engagement at all stages of our relationships with them. We ensure we are inclusive of all the community.



Lasting Legacy – we focus on what communities need now and in the future. We aspire to ensure that communities are left in a sustainable position after our interventions. We prioritise supporting communities' green transition.



Good Governance – we commit to an approach which builds trust with communities and uses proportionate management approaches.

Based on the specific needs of both the United Kingdom and Ireland we further deliver to the following principles:



Place-based funder - focusing on the areas near our renewable development sites and the specific needs of the communities within these areas. We ensure agency for the specific needs of the local area.



Flexible funding - understanding that the environment around projects can change. We respond quickly to emerging local issues and changing priorities.



Social Impact – we commit to using proportionate and meaningful measures to report on our impact against the UN Sustainable Development Goals and on our sustainability commitments.

Types of SSE Renewables community funds:



Local funds – empowering the communities nearest to wind farms to develop and enhance the services, assets, and activities their residents need now and for the future.



Regional funds – sharing the benefits of renewables with wider communities. The regional funds invest in transformational projects which provide socio-economic growth for lasting impact.



Scholarships – supporting local students undertaking STEM degrees to ensure local regions have the workforce of tomorrow.



Skills projects – ensuring that communities have the skills they need for the future including training projects for school children, employment schemes and apprenticeships.

The regional funds support the local authority areas in which we operate wind farms and help to share the value of renewables by investing in transformational projects supporting communities for years to come. The funding decisions are made by independent panels.

Alleviating extreme fuel poverty





Living with fuel poverty has far reaching impacts, particularly on health and wellbeing, as well as learning, employment, and social networks. Highland communities face worse extreme fuel poverty than residents in other areas of Scotland, with 22% of homes impacted compared to a national average of 11%. To help reduce the impact within the Highlands, the Sustainable Development Fund panel made its largest award of £1 million to support the Highland Energy Efficiency Programme which provides energy efficiency measures including solar, battery, air source heating and insulation to households in extreme fuel poverty. The support from the Sustainable Development Fund will enable 250 households to have warmer and more efficient homes.

Training the frontline

In response to the need to reach more people during the cost-of-living challenges, Thurso Community Development Trust has developed the Community Energy Support Training Programme. The project gives training to frontline grassroots community-based staff and volunteers throughout the Highlands and equips them to identify residents who may be experiencing issues. The frontline workers learn to deliver conversations within the community about energy and fuel poverty and confidently signpost residents to further support. The project will engage 400 of the organisations and train 2,000 frontline staff and volunteers over a two-year period.

Gro for Good supports the transition to sustainable agriculture methods in the Highlands. Gro for Good will install an 'interpretive dome' on the innovation campus in Tain which will provide information on consumer awareness and behavioural change surrounding food and drink in relation to net zero. It will showcase Gro for Good's Scottish Green Energy Award winning aquaponics food growing approach. Aquaponics is a food production approach that has been practiced since 10,000AD, is incredibly energy and water efficient, and can provide a huge diverse range of crops, year-round and in spaces that traditional methods would not typically work in. It is set up using growing beds and fish tanks and uses waste from one element to benefit the other. The site aims to inspire up to 50,000 visitors.



SSE Renewables provides local community funds to support the communities nearest the renewable asset. The local funds are administered by either panels made of local community members or by community trusts. The funds focus on priority themes as identified during a community consultation.



415 Projects

2022/23 has been a busy year for the funds with a particular focus on increasing the capacity of communities, including conducting feasibility studies, and employing development workers to implement local priority projects. The communities have continued to ensure their most vulnerable are protected by providing cost of living support and an increased focus on investing in green projects. In the next year funds will focus on the 10th anniversary of the Keadby Community Fund.



Investing in traditional music

Music is one of the founding elements of the heritage of the Highlands and Islands and interest in traditional music has been rising in recent years. Feis air an Oir will deliver a two-year project to enable local people to learn, experience and participate in music. The programme will be delivered across the north coast of Sutherland from Melness to Melvich and includes weekly tuition classes and professional lessons for 100 residents in Gaelic song, accordion, bagpipes, and fiddle.

The programme will culminate in an annual week-long summer feis which will incorporate performances, ceilidhs, classes, and activities for all ages. The feis will include a mini feis for children aged 0-5 to provide a gentle introduction to the music, language and culture associated with feis activities. Each evening performance in the summer feis will be attended by up to 200 residents and visitors.

Catching a wave in Shetland



The Viking Community Fund will be the UK's largest onshore community benefit fund worth circa £72 million over its lifetime, including a four-year advanced fund to provide early grants and complete a community consultation. The fund is managed by Shetland Community Benefit Fund and supports all 18 community council areas in Shetland. In the last year, 67 projects have been supported from enhancing the marina in Aith to expanding a tree nursery in Stanley Hill. The fund provides new opportunities for the region, such as the support for the Scottish Surfing Federation's 'Gathering of the Clans'. For the first time the event was held in Shetland and attracted surfers from across Scotland and further afield to tackle the waves at Sumburgh.

Creating inclusive opportunities







Autistic people have some very valuable skills which can be applied in the workplace but very often they need support to help ensure their employment suits their personal requirements. Perth Autism Support helps 32 autistic young people in rural areas to overcome barriers by providing employability coaching, work placements and certificated training. The young person receives coaching from a peer with lived experience to help manage their transition to work. The project also provides support for local employers to successfully manage autistic staff including providing specialist understanding autism/neurodiversity training. The project supports the local economy by allowing the skills and strengths of young people to remain in the communities thus creating a strong, diverse workforce with a range of abilities.

"The Griffin and Calliachar funding allowed us to deliver supported employability opportunities to autistic young people. The funding allowed young people to attain SQA Employability Awards and work experience with local employers. Many communities who benefit from wind farms have great ambition and goals but find it challenging to implement ideas due to volunteer capacity. Spean Bridge, Roy Bridge and Achnacarry SCIO chose to employ a part time Community Development Officer to help them progress their ambition. Tony helps develop and enhance community projects and establish local initiatives. In his first year in post, he has developed a community website and social media presence, completed a community consultation, and developed a community action plan for the next five years. He provides fundraising and management support to a range of community projects and establishes new community initiatives such as warm space lunches.

Investing in young people remains a central focus for community funds. There are five rural apprenticeship programmes supported by the funds. The apprenticeship programmes match a local young person with a key local business and ensure that there are viable employment opportunities to retain young people in the local area thus ensuring that the local economy benefits from thriving local businesses.

In 2022/23 the apprenticeship schemes have had a focus on supporting key industries which are recovering after the pandemic and impacted by inflation increases including hospitality, whisky, and house building. The types of apprenticeships supported include joinery, plumbing, quantity surveying and spirit operations.

Jordan's apprenticeship with GKM Roofing has been supported by the Gordonbush Apprenticeship Project. The apprenticeship has been perfect for Jordan as it enabled him to continue living in his local village and gain skills in a key local sector.



Helping when it is needed most





Many communities have faced unexpected pressure on local projects when higher inflation increased the costs of goods and services. The panels and community trusts have ensured the community funds have been available to support groups during this time including providing additional grants for increased capital costs and delivering workshops to support funding applications. The panel of the Keadby Community Fund in North Lincolnshire supported an application to fund a Winter Warmth Scheme across the local parishes over the winter months. The project enabled local halls and venues to open to provide warm lunches and social activities to vulnerable residents. The scheme also enabled local people to access signposting and support from local agencies. The project was a significant support to local residents and was delivered in eight local communities.

Creating facilities for children and families

Many of the communities the community funds support have ageing populations and a common priority for funds is developing the services and assets which would attract young families to their area. A public consultation in the village of Wellbank identified that the current play facilities were 40 years old and that an upgrade to the facility would encourage children and families to spend more time outside, as well as provide a space for the community to come together without having to travel by car. Local children were involved in the planning of the playpark which has quad swings, a beam course, and a pavilion shelter.

The Dogger Bank Community Fund is investing £1 million during the construction of the wind farm with a focus on increasing STEM attainment in local communities. In Redcar and Cleveland, a new STEM careers programme 'Building Our Futures' has been supported to embed STEM careers education within every primary school. Schools gain a career audit, expert professional development for staff and governors and the delivery of a six module careers programme. Each school is partnered with a local STEM employer who provides practical sessions for children including sessions on STEM careers and an interactive STEM challenge. The programme ensures children have the skills and knowledge to access the jobs of the future.





Concluding the Beatrice Community Fund



The Beatrice Community Fund was the first offshore wind farm fund delivered by SSE Renewables and partners (p52). The fund has supported 361 local projects including helping 73 rural jobs and enhancing 64 community assets. An evaluation of the fund highlighted that 91% of projects supported are still in operation and 100% of respondents would recommend offshore funds to other communities. A key success of the fund has been the agility in responding to local priorities and issues including providing emergency funding during the coronavirus pandemic. The fund has also safeguarded local assets such as the East Beach Bridge in Lossiemouth. In 2019, access to the local beach was closed for safety reasons and the Beatrice Community Fund provided emergency funding of £50,000 to Lossiemouth Community Development Trust to start a £1.8 million infrastructure project to restore access. The beach is estimated to contribute £1.5 million to the local economy each year.

To achieve Northern Ireland's 2050 net zero targets all areas of our community need to act. One of the key changes that community groups can take is decarbonising their heating. Roo Valley Enterprise is a charity who works for the benefit of the local community by supporting community enterprise and enhancing local developments. Roo Valley Enterprise has a sustainability ambition and were an early adopter of solar electricity to both reduce their electricity bills but also their carbon usage. To help them enhance this provision they received funding to install a battery which will enable them to store excess energy.



Republic of Ireland

SSE Renewables is the Ireland's clean energy champion with 700MW of operational onshore wind farms. These include Ireland's largest wind farm, the 174MW Galway Wind Park in Connemara, County Galway, which is co-owned with Greencoat Renewables.

Excellence in decarbonised training

To achieve meaningful and lasting climate action in Ireland we need to ensure households across the country achieve home energy upgrades. The requirement for home retrofits is at the centre of the country's climate priorities, including new national retrofit targets. To respond to this national requirement there is a need for a significant upskilling of installers to meet the increasing demand for the improvements.

Comhairle Ceantar na nOileán received €110,000 to establish the Low Carbon and Sustainability Centre of Excellence in Casla. The centre will create new sustainable economic opportunities that will contribute to the economic, social, and environmental sustainability of the region by supporting the re-skilling of workers and supporting homeowners to complete improvements. The centre will provide skills in emerging retrofit technologies including solar PV, external wall insulation and ventilation. The project will train 280 professionals per annum and support the energy improvement of up to 10,000 local homes.
