Eligibility

To be eligible for funding, your project must benefit communities that lie wholly within the East Coast Communities of Caithness, Sutherland and the following four community council areas in Ross-shire – Edderton, Tain, Inver, Tarbat, they must also be eligible to apply to the Coastal Communities Fund administered by the Scottish Government.

You don't need to be a registered charity to apply, but your organisation must have a constitution (governing document or set of rules) and not be set up for individual profit. If you are unsure if your group is eligible, please contact us for advice.

Where does this money come from?	Communities can access funds which we have made available on a voluntary basis by Beatrice Offshore Wind Farm Ltd (BOWL), who are currently constructing the 84 turbine Beatrice offshore wind farm off the Caithness coast.	
	For over ten years now SSE has established funds to enable communities to develop sustainably by funding charitable and community initiatives. SSE will therefore manage and administer the Beatrice Partnership Fund on BOWL's behalf. The Fund will be available for a period of five years.

When must grants be spent by?	 Any grant received should begin drawing down spend within one year of being awarded. Long-term projects (such as building work or multi-year projects) will be released in stages and must demonstrate progress within one year of award.
What happens when the project is finished?	 One of the key requirements of the fund is to comprehensively monitor and evaluate your project, track its progress and understand what the direct impact of the project has been on the local economy. At the end of the activity period you must submit a final evaluation report in which we will ask you to fully report on the project and its outcomes.
What's the difference between this fund and SSE's local community funds?	 This fund supports projects which take a long-term view and focus on the identified priority theme. Groups based within the East Coast Communities of Caithness and Sutherland and within the community council areas of Edderton, Tain, Inver, Tarbat, are eligible to apply. Local funds exist to support the community organisations closest to our wind farms to help them achieve their aims. Only groups from the immediate local area to the development are eligible to apply. Groups that are eligible to apply to SSE's local community funds are also eligible to apply to the Beatrice Partnership Fund.
Are there any activities you're unable to support?	 Projects which do not meet the Beatrice Partnershipt Fund criteria Projects which do not benefit people living within the East Coast communities of Caithness and Sutherland and the community council areas of Edderton, Tain, Inver and Tarbat.
